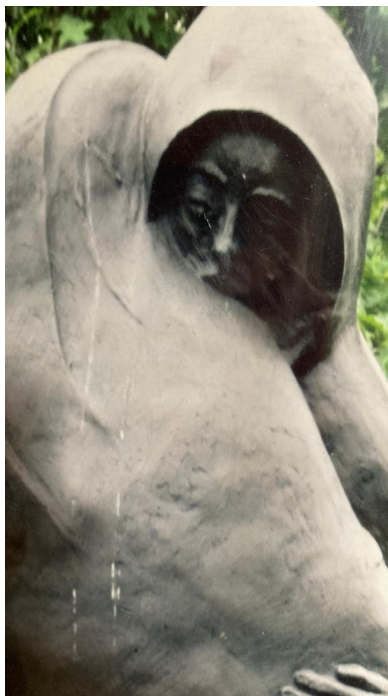
"Administer justice each new day, and rescue from the hand of the oppressor the person who has been robbed" (Jer. 21:12). Justice and peace are to be the motive force for all our actions. As beloved children of God who sent his only Son into the world to seek out and find the lost. As the Word of God chose to live among us, we are to live in solidarity with the poor and accompany them in their struggles. Like Christ, we are to manifest the Father's merciful love for the poor. We are called to be instruments of God's loving compassion for the poor. Christ took our humanity to himself to share our darkness and pain. Love is possible in moments of vulnerability and need. Sharing with the poor means mutual enrichment, both are givers, and both are gifts.

Christmas is not just a time nor is it a season. It is a state of mind, an outpouring of the heart. The challenge before us is to lengthen the time frame. The option for the poor must not be restricted to the Giving Season. We need to discover ways of expressing love and compassion every day of the year. Following the example of Christ who came into the world as our companion for the journey home, we need to spend time with one another, to listen to one another, to affirm and give one another a reason to live. The Word became Flesh and we have been made new. As disciples of the one who has come into the world to establish a kingdom of justice and righteousness, we must live lives that are just and righteous. May the Word Incarnate show us his ways, guide us in his truth, and teach us how to abound in love. I'll close by reading a few stanzas from a poem by Charles Péguy.

I am, God says, Master of three virtues.
Faith is a faithful spouse.
Charity is a mother burning with devotion.
But hope is a very small girl.
I am, God says, Master of three virtues.
Charity is she who extends herself over the centuries.
But my little hope
is the one who each morning
says Good Day to us.
I am, God says, Lord of the Three Virtues.
Faith is a great tree, an oak rooted in the heart,
And under the wings of that tree,
Charity, my daughter Charity shelters all the distress of the world.
And my little hope is only that little promise of a bud which shows
itself at the very beginning of April."

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

We were reminded of the Ark of the Covenant being brought into Jerusalem and the question of King David this past week. After the first attempt (which did not go well) there was a period of time



before he asked the question 'how can the Ark of the Lord come to me?'. There was that similar question on the part of Elizabeth when our Blessed Mother approached her as she said 'most blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb.' What follows was the question 'and how does it happen to me that the Mother of my Lord should come to me?' The appreciation of the word 'tabernacle' comes into the conversation. That which was carried by the Israelites in the wilderness and which eventually arrived in Jerusalem. The implication in Luke is that our Blessed

Mother was tabernacled with the Word made Flesh. The tabernacle housed the tablets given to Moses on Sinai. A Jesuit priest Fr. Laramie wrote of a tradition that included pieces of manna which was given to sustain the people during the exodus. I found that interesting to the degree that we who share in the Eucharist become tented presences ourselves as we are tabernacled with the presence of Christ through the Eucharist. I recollected (more than once) that a priest friend walked the distance that Mary walked to the house of Elizabeth. She was not alone as she walked with the presence of Christ within here. Advent is a period of preparation for the first coming as we recollect that He was born in time. It also is an opportunity to appreciate how we walk as those who are tabernacled with the same presence that is given us as we partake in the meal of the Eucharist. There is much distraction this time of year that can deter us from the kind of attentive waiting for the second coming as we recall the first. Attentive to the relationship that dwells within us as members of His body. Attentive to the manner of life that we communicate and share and transmit that demonstrates a way of living that is indicative of the Word made Flesh within us. The use of a monstrance in our tradition has the Blessed Sacrament in the center. The same is used as we are blessed (as we do on the Feast of Corpus Christi). May we be demonstrators of the blessings that come from our being tabernacled with Jesus as we continue in our walk of life. May we embrace the life as Elizabeth embraced the presence within Mary our mother herself.

From Bobbi Bugaj

In preparation for Tuesday's vespers, I remembered some of what Fr. Peter Mihalic had shared at his talk last weekend about grace. There is sanctifying grace that remains in my soul and actual grace that acts on the soul from the outside to condition that which is within. Then in 1 Cor 1:4-9 we read that Paul is thankful for the gifts he and I have both been given and that we do not lack any spiritual gifts. This weekend we celebrate the Third week of Advent, I think of joy. (Gaudete meaning rejoice). I love sanctifying grace that makes me a child of God and I am joyful for that. Advent gives me the time to dust away cobwebs, consider how I have changed in the year and to restore, reconnect and recommit to what I believe. 1 Cor 1:4-9 comes along for at least three weeks during Advent, and gives me the opportunity to focus on what has been given to me. It is there to remind me how was your year, how was your week and how was your day because God is with me always. This brings total joy to my life because I know that the Lord is near even in those times when I get distracted off this path that I so willingly walk. As I write this, I think of actual grace (I call them nudges) because there are constant outside nudges that say, "Hey Bobbi, maybe this way is a better idea." Over the years I have homed in on those nudges, especially when taking care of Mom. I have found that when I am taking care of someone else even the smallest of decisions ends up with "Am I doing the right thing?" Then the nudges start, this week has been a song by Curtis Stephen appropriately titled "Ready the Way." The reminder that sometimes when I am not listening to God in my heart I am nudged to look at God in the world. I am nudged to look up and see the world through the eyes of God. Whenever I do that I have always found joy and healing. One of the lines in Mr. Stephen's song is "Let us see your face: in our hearts we prepare a place. Come bring this world your mercy and grace as we ready the way for you, Lord." This line, is important because He does let me see His face in all that he does for me. In the people I meet, in the intricacies of a snow flake, in my silent time. I do prepare a place in my heart and work to keep from being distracted. In doing this I realize, everything is grace. I am blessed to walk this path every year and I encounter (if I so embrace) the mercy to see the grace. Advent brings me joy because I celebrate the coming of the King and I embrace the return. I work at making the path straight and know that while narrow, it encompasses love and truth. There is a warm and loving feeling in my heart this day as I think of all this, all the graces that I encounter. I love the nudges in the world, keeping me on this path that I desire whole heartily to walk. I am again restored, renewed, reconnected and recommit myself to this journey of love. I love Advent.

I will be hosting a Patriotic Concert & Event this summer. I'm thinking the second weekend of July (11, 12 or 13) of 2025.

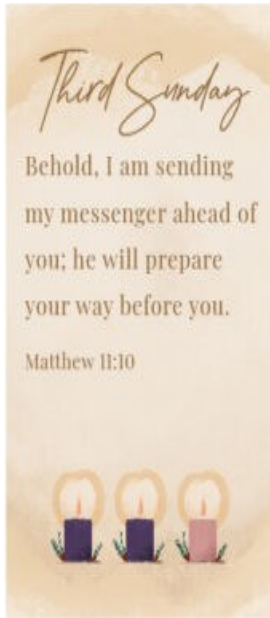
