Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception Genesis 3: 9-15, 20 ~ Ephesians 1: 3-6, 11-12 ~ Luke 1: 26-38

"The most Blessed Virgin Mary, in the first instance of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted by Almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the human race, was preserved free from all stain of original sin" (Ineffabilis Deus). Ben Sirach wrote, "Sin entered the world through a woman, and because of her we all die" (Sir. 25:24). The savior of mankind entered the world through Mary and because of her, we have become heirs to eternal life. Eve was taken from Adam's side as he slumbered. Mary, the new Eve, was brought forth from Christ's pierced side as he hung on the cross in the slumber of death. As death was the fruit of the tree in Paradise, eternal life was the fruit of the tree of the Cross.

The Eternal Word, the Beloved Son of the Father, "who is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13:8), prepared a fitting dwelling place where he would pitch his tent among men. Because he is eternally changeless, he could, and did, apply to Mary the merits of his suffering and death. From the first moment of her conception, Mary became the first fruit of the new creation. Looking down from his heavenly throne, the Beloved Son saw the new life implanted in Anna's womb and said, "Behold, I am making all things new" (Rev. 21:5). The obedient daughter supplanted the disobedient mother. The daughter of Eve, who had been driven out of the garden (CF. Gen 2:23), became the enclosed garden (CF. Song 4:12) where the Incarnate Word delighted to dwell. The chosen virgin of Nazareth would give birth to the one who held her in his hand.


The promised enmity between Satan's offspring and the woman's offspring is proof that God had a plan for our salvation in mind even before the creation of the world. While Satan used a serpent to seduce Eve, God would use Eve's offspring to crush the serpent. The heel that crushed the serpent's head belonged to the foot of God's only begotten Son. His hands molded his mother's body in Anna's womb. He was the Potter and she the clay, the work of his hands (CF. Is. 64:8). He modeled her after the design of his sanctuary in heaven and took great delight in her (CF. Gen. 1:31). As he looked upon the work of his hands he said, "This is my resting place, here will I dwell, for this is the home I have chosen" (Ps. 132:14).

Throughout her life and for ages unending, Mary's Immaculate Heart has echoed the new song of God's redeeming love. "Worthy is the Lamb to receive power and wealth and wisdom and strength and honor and glory and blessing" (Rev. 5:12). She sings this new song acknowledging the wonders he has done, celebrating her lord and son's praise, and declaring God's ever-faithful love.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

I offered Mass with the St. Benedict school community on Tuesday. The reading from Genesis as well as Matthew were about genealogies or better the tracing of the lines of descent. The first reading was incomplete in that names of those who were out of compliance with the expectations placed upon those who (in a sense) misrepresented the direction of holiness. Perhaps a question of formation and development that did not redound to performance that was faithful to God. It was also the final days of preparation for the first



coming. Which had me thinking about the same words of how we are formed and develop and how we perform in like manner and being in accord with the Way of Jesus born to us. I recollected a story from many years back about a basketball coach who called a time out while his team was not playing well. A time out to reorganize and stay with the game plan against a very good CYO team. After the brief meeting play resumed and, as I recall

in my hearing, the referee called another time out. It seemed that one of the players was shadowing the referee up and down the court. The referee asked the young player what he was doing. The player responded that his coach told them to stay close to the one on the court who was giving them a hard time. He indicated that the coach may have been critical of some of the referee's calls. That said, play resumed soon after. My thoughts then turned to personal responsibility and playing the game well. The appreciation of being formed in likeness to the One born to us. That development might be the most important relationship that many of us might not acknowledge as we might as well the expectation of carrying out and further developing the Life within us. When I asked who was the first pick or beginning of the genealogy (so to speak) the local Cleveland team and one player drafted, it took a while to get to Mr. Cavalier who attended Holy Redeemer School in Washington D. C. and later Mackin Catholic High school and on to Notre Dame. That would be Austin Carr. Tracing the lines of descent after Mr. Carr I was given names that they would be more familiar with and I suppose the emphasis I wanted to encourage was how and where we participate in our ability to be the kind of presence through instruction and seek to develop in relationship to others as a people of God. A community, if not a team in need of direction and instruction and inasmuch as the word coach is one who carries us amid the contests of life. "Contestari" in Latin gives us the word "witness." It is a matter of giving testimony and truth be told, we are called to be living witnesses as part of the community of faith. Thinking back to the Genesis reading perhaps they might be appreciated a 'not team' players that sought their own manner of life contrary to the direction of God. Perhaps as well the beginning of Matthew needs be thought of as an opportunity of furthering the one born to us in our own daily living as individuals and the community or truly the Body of Christ.

This past Tuesday's evening prayer began with the words "do not stifle the Spirit." What a great thought for going into the last week of advent. 

A Message From Bishop Edward C. Malesic, JCL
